

From the Board of Supervisors...

Back in 2015, a very important development occurred in Warwick which has paid dividends to Township residents and businesses. The construction of a Township-owned emergency medical services (EMS) station was completed on Meyer Way across from the Wawa. While this news is not new, the statistical results are now demonstrating how much of an asset the EMS station is to the Township. The station's presence, in the heart of Warwick, has dramatically reduced EMS response times. The chart below demonstrates the success of this vital Township investment:

After the EMS station was opened in 2016 the response times have reduced by almost one full minute for both Advance Life Support (ALS) and Basic Life Support (BLS). If you look back 10 years, the reduction is even greater. Every minute is crucial in a medical emergency.

Our station is operated by Central Bucks EMS. Central Bucks EMS was established in 1959 as a non-profit volunteer ambulance company to provide emergency medical care to our growing community. There are over 160,000 residents in the nearly 120 square miles of communities they serve. You can read more about Central Bucks EMS at chems.org.

Furthermore, the Warwick Township Board of Supervisors has remained committed to providing the best emergency services while not increasing property taxes in 10 years.



New County Data Available to the Public

The Bucks County Commissioners and the Bucks County Planning Commission have developed a public platform so that individuals are able to explore data which may be important to residents, businesses and visitors of the County. Part of this platform includes interactive maps which provide a wide variety of information including proposed Subdivision and Land Development within municipalities throughout the County. This map allows the user to select a parcel and find out what proposals have been submitted to the Bucks County Planning Commission for review and often provides the plan set/review letters associated with the proposal. Be aware when reviewing this information that the proposals may not be approved or may have been withdrawn. Follow up with the associated municipality for more information. Please Help Stop the Spread of the Spotted Lanternfly

The Spotted Lanternfly (Lycorma delicatula) or SLF is an invasive insect that was discovered in Berks County, Pennsylvania in 2014. The SLF is proving to be very destructive to agricultural crops (particularly grapes) as well as many trees you may have in your yard.



containment. Check your vehicle as well as any outdoor equipment for SLF egg masses, adults and nymphs before going in and out of the quarantine zone. SLF egg masses may be present from fall to spring.

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture and the USDA are committed to stopping the spread of the SLF. Bucks County (along with 12 other counties) including Warwick Township, has been part of the Pennsylvania Order of Quarantine and Treatment. Despite the quarantine, the SLF continues to move into other areas.

For information about the quarantine, please visit: https://extension.psu.edu/spotted-lanternfly and choose the Spotted Lanternfly Management option "How to Comply with the State Quarantine." You will find a Checklist for Residents Living in Spotted Lanternfly Quarantine Areas at that site. This checklist will help you to identify where the insect lays its eggs. These eggs can be found on all types of surfaces, not just trees.

Since the insect pest readily hitches rides on vehicles, the policy of "Look Before You Leave" is crucial to

Because the SLF lays its eggs on surfaces in the fall, it is best to destroy the egg masses BEFORE they hatch in the spring. The best way to control the spread of this destructive insect is to check your property NOW and destroy the egg masses. We must all work together to reduce the population of this insect and safeguard our precious landscapes. Learn how to identify and destroy this pest. 

Warwick Memorial Park is Opening!

For those of you who do not know, Memorial Park has a very long history that dates back to 1996 when the Township received 50 acres for a park from the developer of Heritage Creek. That developer later sold to Toll Brothers who started the process of development for the park. Since 1996, the park went through three names, 50 Acre Park, Moland Park and finally what it will now be called, Warwick Memorial Park. This mostly passive park will have a large playground, Safety Town, a pavilion with bathrooms and multi-use trails.

Several grants were received throughout this process to make the park a reality. We received \$374,000 from the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources that covered the majority of the park improvements. We received \$50,000 from the Department of Community and Economic Development Keystone Communities Program for the completion of Safety Town. Lastly, we also received \$10,000 from the PECO Green Region Open Space Program that was for tree plantings. The park and its amenities would not have been possible without the support of all of these agencies.

Construction began in 2017 and we are proud to finally be able to open this long awaited park in July 2019.

The ribbon cutting ceremony is scheduled for Saturday, July 6 at 10am at the park. You will be able to play on the new playground, zoom around in Safety Town, use the bathrooms in the new pavilion and take advantage of the 7,500+ feet of paved walking paths.

The park is located at 1200 Memorial Drive, Warwick, PA 18974. Once you turn onto Memorial Drive from York Road, the park entrance is the first right.

Dedicate an ornamental or shade tree in honor of a special person or a special event. You are able to pick the type of tree from an approved list. All trees will have a minimum 3.5" caliper. Donor may select the location with the Director's approval. Cost includes purchase and planting of the tree.

Add a plaque to your tree for an additional \$250. An in-ground, cast bronze plaque, measuring 10.5" x

3", four lines of text, 24 characters/spaces per line.

Park Benches \$1,000



Remember a loved one or celebrate a joyous occasion with a park bench. Our 6 foot benches are made of recycled plastic. Personalize your bench with an engraved cast bronze 8" x 2" plaque. Plaques may contain text only (no photos or graphics), three lines of text, 18 characters/spaces per line. Donor may select the location with the Director's approval. Cost includes purchase of bench, plaque and installation.





WHY ARE CAMERAS ON TOP OF TRAFFIC SIGNAL LIGHTS?

The cameras that you are seeing on the traffic signal poles in Warwick Township and other municipalities are video detection cameras. They are replacing the older technology of the "Induction Loop" which were imbedded in the pavement. The loop system required you to drive over a pressure sensor in the roadway to activate the signal to turn green. During PennDOT's reconstruction of York Road (State Road Route 263), all traffic signals in the project were upgraded with camera systems.

The cameras are used as motion sensors to time the lights for best traffic flow. They are NOT red-light violation cameras. These cameras are solely for traffic detection.

How These Signal Cameras Work

The camera is aimed at a section of pavement when there is no traffic present. This creates an image for the system. When a car, bike, or person enters the image the pixels change and the controller (computer) detects that there is traffic in that direction that needs to be served. The goal is to be as responsive as possible to real time traffic conditions.

"Why won't the light change for me? I have been waiting here a long time!"

A common concern is excessive wait time at intersections. The reason could be the position of your vehicle in relation to the traffic camera. The cameras are pointed toward vehicles before the traffic stop bar (white lines painted across the road). If you have moved past the traffic stop bar (inched up closer to the intersection), the camera can no longer detect that you are there. You need to be stopped just behind the line for the camera to see you and prepare to change the signal.

Colonial Garden Started at Moland House

The Warwick Township Historical Society has begun an 18th Century formal garden at Moland House Historic Park. The Society, which maintains the Moland House and property, has voted to use the master plan, pictured below, that was created by Society board member Murrie Gayman as the basis for this project. Though no time line for completion has been established, Phase One has already commenced

The Society is thrilled to have the enthusiastic support of the Master Gardeners of Bucks County, who have offered to plant and maintain the garden. It is intended to be an ornamental garden, including native plants, and to be a dramatic and beautiful venue for wedding photos and other social events.

The garden will feature a brick walkway, and to help fund this undertaking, the Historic Society has started an engraved brick program. Why Should You Care About Stormwater?

What is Stormwater?

Stormwater runoff is the water from a rain event or snow melt that runs across the ground. Stormwater may infiltrate into the ground, runoff into storm sewers and streams, evaporate into the air or be used by plants.

• Why is Stormwater a problem?

Stormwater running across lawns, roads, driveways, and parking lots can pick up pollutants such as oil, fertilizers, salt, dirt/sediment and trash and carry these pollutants to the storm sewers and streams.

With more development, there are more surfaces that do not allow the water to infiltrate which increases the volume of water flowing into our storm sewers and streams causing more frequent flooding.

The increased flow in streams causes more streambank erosion. The erosion eats away at the ground adjacent to the stream and soil is carried away in the stream which damages the natural habitat for fish and other aquatic life.

How can you help?

There are many ways a homeowner can help protect our streams. Here are some ways you can help:



Reduce the amount of mowed grass and plant native trees and shrubs which have larger root systems.

Reduce impervious areas that prevent the stormwater from infiltrating into the ground. Use pervious paving systems for walkways and patios.

Do not over fertilize.

Install a rain barrel to irrigate your garden.

Create a rain garden to collect rain water and allow it to infiltrate or be used by the plants.



E-Waste is a popular informal name for the electronic products nearing the end of their useful life.

PAR-Recycle Works, a federally tax-exempt IRC section 501(c)(3) organization, is a social enterprise offering environmentally responsible recycling services while providing life changing workforce training to formerly incarcerated individuals.

Taking electronic waste and other recyclables, PAR-Recycle Works deconstructs these items, recycles the materials and disposes of the waste safely and cleanly. The scrap metals and other reusable materials collected in this process are then sold to help pay for salaries and job skill development for formerly incarcerated individuals in order to support their productive re-entry back into society.

 brought into compliance for less than the cost of constructing a permanent
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


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
