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From the Board of Supervisors...

As we approach Spring, we are excited to announce our 2022 capital projects. To assemble this capital projects budget, we solicited input from both our professional staff, residents, and our recently completed 5-year capital improvements plan. Fortunately, through conservative spending, grant awards, and a strong local economy, additional roads were able to be added to this year's road program! Below is a list of the prominent projects you can expect this year.

MOVING ON TO 2022!

Watch in the mail for your County/Township Real Estate tax bill. They will be mailed by March 1st. The discount due date is April 30th or June 30th with no discount. Central Bucks School Real Estate tax bills will be mailed by July 1st. They are due at discount by August 31st or October 31st at no discount. There is also an installment option. Three payments due by August, September and October. There is no discount for installments. Please call the tax office if you do not receive your tax bill or have questions. Properties with assessment changes will receive a notice from the Bucks County Board of Assessment. Interim bills will then be mailed. New homeowners or a property with a deed change last year, please remember to apply for the Homestead credit. You may receive a notice from the Bucks

County Board of Assessment. This form is due to them by March 1st for 2022.

ALL RESIDENTS PLEASE REMEMBER, WE HAVE A 1% EARNED INCOME TAX. You must file an annual return with Keystone Collections by April 15th. This office collects only real estate taxes. 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Visible House Numbers

Most people think the address numbers at the street, on the mailbox or on the front of their home or business are for postal or other delivery services to be able to find them. This is true, but in the case of an emergency these numbers are one of the first and most important steps in an emergency response. These numbers are crucial to getting emergency responders to the exact location where help is needed quickly. Without the numbers being readily available to see and read, response delays may occur which can greatly affect the outcome of some emergencies.


Chapter 57 of the Code of Warwick Township establishes the requirements for having to number buildings and dwellings within the Township. It states the numbers shall be a minimum of three inches high and that they are to be placed by the front door or another easily recognizable area. And most of all, that they must be **CLEARLY VISIBLE FROM THE STREET**. If you have trees, bushes, or other obstructions in front of the numbers it will be difficult for responders to find the location in an emergency. If your building or dwelling is more than fifty feet from the road, address numbers shall be placed on the front of the structure **AND** on a post sign or mailbox near the street and driveway entrance to the property. They must also be positioned in a manner that can be seen from both directions of travel. It is also recommended that the numbers be reflective or high contrast to make them easier to see at night.

Having your property address properly placed and clearly visible could save precious time if an emergency should occur. Take a few moments and make sure your property is properly numbered.



Know Your Local Wildlife – Benefits of Trees

Trees are an extremely valuable resource; did you know Pennsylvania means Penn's Woods? Trees not only provide food and shelter for our local wildlife, but they also provide many benefits to humans. Trees provide shade which can cool the surrounding area. This is especially important as we continue to expand our impervious surfaces. Have you ever



noticed the City of Philadelphia tends to be warmer than the suburbs? The lack of tree canopy is a major component. Trees also capture a significant amount of rainfall which is important as we continue to experience flash flooding events, the less rain that makes it to the ground the better. Trees also have the ability to absorb as much as 20% of our annual greenhouse gas emissions which impacts our ozone layer. Next time you consider removing a tree that is not hazardous to people or property you may want to think about the services it is providing you and the community.

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How Rain Gardens Work

Rain gardens are shallow, depressed gardens designed to capture runoff and allow the water to infiltrate into the soil or be used by plants rather than allowing the water to runoff into the streets, storm drains and nearby streams. Rain gardens are a simple, inexpensive way to help reduce runoff and keep pollutants from flowing into the streams and rivers. Rain gardens have many benefits including:

- Filtering pollutants from runoff
- Recharging groundwater
- Conserving water from reduced irrigation
- Removing areas with standing water
- Reducing mosquito breeding areas
- Increasing beneficial insects that eliminate pests
- Creating habitat for birds and butterflies
- Reducing garden maintenance

Where is a good location for a Rain Garden?

Find a low area in your yard that is at least 10 feet away from the house foundation and 25 feet away from septic system drain field or well head. The best locations are in partial to full sun.

Rain Garden Plants

Rain gardens should be planted with easy-to-maintain native plants. Native plants will require less watering to become established. Since the plants will be in a low area, make sure the plants can withstand wet soil for up to 24 hours. After planting, weeding may be needed until the plants become established. Your rain garden may need a

bit more maintenance than a lawn in the beginning, but in the long run it will be easier to care for and provide many added benefits.

Completed Projects in our Park System

It was a busy year for projects in the Warwick Township park system. Some projects took longer than anticipated due to supply chain issues and COVID restrictions, but we were able to complete the list below in 2021.

Jamison Hunt Park

The three tennis courts and basketball court were completely re-done with new paving, fencing, court paint and court equipment. We were also able to pave the parking lot.



Guinea Lane Park

One of the basketball hoops was destroyed in Tropical Depression Ida but we did not just replace the hoop. Our Public Works Department cleared the old court and built a brand-new, full-size court where the old, smaller court was located. Now there is another full-size court in our park system with new court lines and equipment.



Hampton Chase Park

We were able to repave the remaining walking paths in this park. We had completed some when the pond was refurbished a few years ago but now all the paths have been re-paved. The parking lot was also paved and lined.

Memorial Park

We were able to complete the last piece of this park when we graded and seeded the lower field. This field will be able to be used to play catch, fly a kite or just enjoy being outdoors.

We strive to keep our parks safe, clean and user friendly for the whole community.


