From the Board of Supervisors . . .

It is both with admiration and regret that we wish Township Supervisor Edward "Ned" Thompson, Jr., good luck in retirement. After careful consideration Ned made the difficult decision to not seek re-election for 2024. Ned has served Warwick Township for a total of 33 years. He started his passion for local government as a Parks and Recreation Board Member in 1991. After serving eight years in that capacity, Ned was appointed to the position of Township Supervisor in 1998, then first elected in 1999.

Ned championed many long-standing projects enjoyed to this day. He was part of the creation of Community Park (Recreation Station and the spray pole), the acquisition of over 400 acres of preserved open space, the development of Memorial Park, expansion of our sidewalk and trail system, the construction of our emergency medical service station on Meyer Way, and, most recently, the redevelopment of Guinea Lane Park. Ned was also known for standing strong against over development and ensuring the rural character of Warwick Township was preserved for future generations.

On the operations side, Ned valued excellent service to the community while practicing conservative fiscal oversight. Warwick will enter 2024 as one of the most stable, financially and administratively, municipalities in southeastern Pennsylvania, all while not increasing taxes since 2010. During his span of 25 years as Township Supervisor, Ned is the epitome of leaving an organization in better condition than when he inherited it.

Parks Improvements in 2023

It was a busy year for the Parks and Recreation Department as several large projects were completed in 2023.

Community Park saw three projects completed. The very popular spray pole was completely redesigned and now offers numerous water features.



The spray pole was funded in part by a DCNR grant. The basketball courts were re-furbished with new pavement, new court paint and new basketball hoops. A piece of playground equipment was replaced in Recreation Station that incorporates a train theme. Guinea Lane Park had several projects completed. The old pickleball courts were replaced completely with new paving, new fencing and new court markings. We increased the number of courts from 6 to 10. A brand new 90' baseball field was installed. This marks the first 90' field in Warwick Township and will allow our youth to continue their baseball journey through their teenage years and be able to stay right here in Warwick.

A brand new parking lot was installed and a driveway out to Guinea Lane was paved.

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held in October at the park where the 90' field was named in honor of retiring Board of Supervisor Ned Thompson.

The parking lot at the Moland House was paved.

A new playground was installed at the Warwick Greene playground.

50 trees were planted in various areas, including the parks and open space areas. These were planted as part of a PECO Green Region grant.



Know Your Local Wildlife – How do pollinators survive the winter?

Have you ever wondered how bees and other insects survive the winter, many hibernate! You may remember an article from last fall explaining the importance of leaves. Many pollinators find cover and protection in leaf litter through the winter. In addition to leaf litter, they will also make cavity nests in the hollow stems of woody plants such as dogwoods, willows and laurels. This is important to remember as you prune and dispose of garden material. Rocks and logs are also another popular option for winter protection. With this knowledge we can help protect pollinators this winter and give them a safe place to nest.

Public Works Department - Winter Weather FAQ

- **Why did you plow snow back on to my driveway after I cleared it?**

Ideally, don't shovel the end of your driveway until the plows have finished with your street. Remember, all plows are angled to discharge snow to the curb on the right. It is impossible to plow the streets without the plow being angled. When shoveling your driveway, pile snow to the right. This will help prevent the plow from covering your driveway opening again.

- **Tomorrow is trash day, and we are expecting snow tonight. Should I put out my cans?**

No. Trash cans should be removed from streets and curbs to allow free flow of the snowplow.

- **My neighbor blows snow into the street rather than back on to his property. Is this allowed?**

No, it is not! Do not throw or blow the snow that you remove from your driveway or sidewalks back onto the street. This slows the snow removal process, and you could be subject to a fine.

- **York Road (or another State-Owned Road) needs to be plowed. Why aren't you out there?**

There are six state owned roads in Warwick Township. They are: Almshouse Road, Bristol Road, Mearns Road, Rushland Road, Sugarbottom Road and York Road. PennDOT (1-800-932-4600) is responsible for the salting and plowing and maintenance of these roads. Warwick Township cannot plow these roads.

- **It doesn't look like the roads were salted. Will you be out soon?**

Salting operations begin very quickly after the first frozen precipitation starts to accumulate. Our PW employees are dispatched to the snow emergency routes first then to main streets in the subdivisions. Cul-de Sacs are the last streets to be salted due to the relatively low level of vehicular activity. Road salt needs friction to activate. The Road salt may be there but will not instantly melt precipitation upon its application. When a vehicle's tires make contact, the salt responds.

- **Do Township employees perform all the snow plowing in Warwick? I think I saw a contractor's truck.**

During a winter weather event, all PW employees are on duty. Depending on the storm, contracted employees will be dispatched by the Public Works Director to assist us.

Remove Basketball Hoops in the Right-of-Way

Public Works is not responsible for basketball hoops or nets placed along the roadway that may be damaged during snow removal operations. Large snowplow vehicles traveling on residential streets can easily hit into poles and nets hanging over or near the street. Damage can occur to our vehicles and the operator as well as damage to private property. Any basketball hoops or nets left in the right of way (roadways and sidewalks) during the months of November through March could be subject to fine.

Please Prepare Your Mailbox for Winter

PennDOT allows property owners to place mailboxes within the limits of the legal right-of-way, out of respect for the U.S. Postal Service's need to deliver, and mail customers' convenience of delivery. But because those boxes are within the right-of-way, damages are the responsibility of the property owner. Be sure your mailbox has strong support. You may also wish to use reflective tape or other material to make it easier to see during storms or during dark hours. Check your box and support often, clearing snow from it and depositing the snow properly and in a manner to allow you and motorists proper sight distances (and never on the roadway). Homeowners who have followed these tips in the past and still experienced damaged mailboxes may wish to consider installing cantilevered mailbox support that will swing a mailbox out of harm's way. 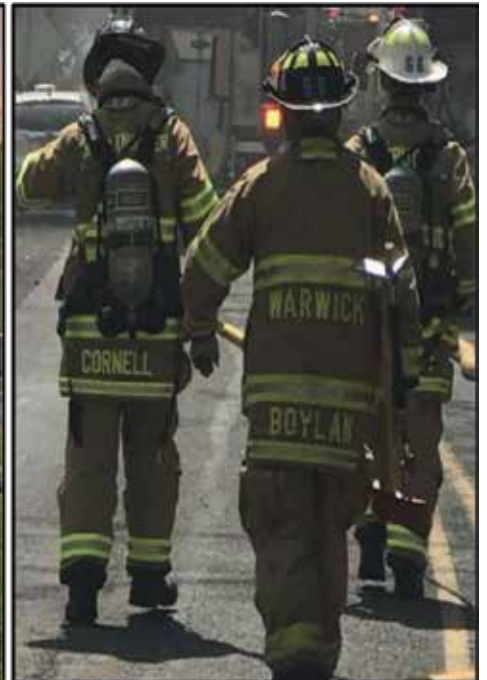


VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

"Neighbors Helping Neighbors"

The winter season can be a fun and festive time of year, with gatherings of family and friends for the holidays. But it can hold many hidden fire and safety hazards as well. Here are some things to keep in mind as you are going through the colder months:

Heating is the second leading cause of US home fires and home fire injuries and third leading cause of home fire deaths. December, January, and February are the peak months for heating fires. Space heaters are the type of equipment most often involved in home heating equipment fires, accounting for more than two of every five fires (44%), as well as most deaths and injuries in home fires caused by heating equipment. Keeping space heaters at least 3 feet away from children, pets and combustible materials is a good start to using them safely. Also, unplugging electric space heaters when not in use or attended is another good way to stay safer.

Fireplaces and chimneys can provide a warm and pleasant way to add warmth to your home, if they are maintained and used correctly. A fireplace chimney should be inspected and

cleaned annually before the fireplace is used the first time for the season. Combustible objects should be a minimum of 4 feet away from the hearth and flammable items should never be hanging from the mantle when the fireplace is in use. Only burn properly dried hardwoods to prevent creosote buildup and chimney fires in wood fireplaces. Never leave a fireplace burning unattended. Only put ash in a metal container with a tight sealing lid. Only dispose of these ashes after they have cooled for a week or more, or after they have been thoroughly wet down. Improperly disposed of ashes have caused many local winter home fires in the past. Take a few extra steps to ensure you are being safe with your fireplace.

December is the peak time of year for home candle fires. The top two days for home candle fires are Christmas and Christmas Eve. Between 2013-2017, an average of 7,900 home candle fires were reported each year. Keeping children and pets away from burning candles and making sure combustible items are not located too close to the flame will reduce the risk of incident.

Carefully decorating your home can help make your holidays safer. Between 2014-2018, U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 160 home fires that started with Christmas trees per year. U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated average of 770 home structure fires per year that began with decorations, excluding Christmas trees. Live Christmas trees are combustible items that become increasingly flammable as they continue to dry out in your home. Keep them well watered while they are in your home. More than one-quarter (29%) of home fires that begin with Christmas trees occur in January as they become older and drier. When the needles become brittle or start dropping off, it is time to dispose of the tree.

Keeping these suggestions in mind during the winter months will help to ensure a safe season for you and your family.



SNOW AND FIRE HYDRANTS

In an emergency, every second counts. You can help to keep your family and neighbors safe this winter season by helping to clear fire hydrants of snow. Please consider adopting a fire hydrant in your neighborhood and make it accessible for first responders to locate and quickly open during an emergency.
