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
### From the Board of Supervisors ...

### **Community information from Chief of Police Mark Goldberg**

Our officers have been investigating thefts of outgoing mail from residential mailboxes. The mailboxes being targeted are the ones at the curb, near the end of the home's driveway. The thieves are looking for outgoing mail containing personal checks. The personal checks are "washed" and filled out with fraudulent information. The thieves then attempt to cash these fraudulent checks or use the account information to make online payments.

Several of our neighborhoods have been targeted, including Hidden Ponds and Mountain View. We have also heard of similar crimes in Warrington, Horsham and Northampton.

We actively investigate these crimes, which cause hardship, inconvenience and monetary loss to our residents. With Northampton Police, we arrested and charged several of these thieves in 2023. If you have been victimized, please call us.

Protect yourself!! Don't put outgoing mail in your home mailbox for the mail carrier to collect.

The safest thing to do is take your mail directly to a US Post Office and deposit the mail in the collection bin INSIDE.

### Township Ordinance Reminder - Signage Tom Jones, CZO - Zoning Officer

Throughout the year, signs of all shapes and sizes need to be repaired, maintained, and/or upgraded for various reasons. A sign, by definition, is any device, structure, fixture, painting, emblem, or visual that uses words, graphics, colors, illumination, symbols, numbers, or letters for the purpose of communicating a message which is displayed in any manner whatsoever so that it can be seen from the right-of-way of any public or private road or from any neighboring property.

If you plan on constructing or altering any sign within the Township, including the sign face or supporting structure, please contact the Zoning Officer for the general regulations. The regulations include sign height and area, sign illumination and the applicability of temporary or permanent sign permits. Furthermore, the Warwick Township Board of Supervisors will need to review permit applications for properties located within the Corridor Overlay District for specific design requirements prior to approval. If you are unsure if you are

in the Corridor Overlay District you may consult the Township Zoning Map or Township staff.

According to Township Ordinance, Chapter 195 of the Warwick Township Code, Zoning, §195-91 Signs Scope



**and Applicability** – In all zoning districts, signs shall be erected, altered, maintained, used, removed or moved in compliance with the provisions of this chapter and any other applicable ordinances and regulations.

§195-97.1(A) Permit required – It shall be unlawful to erect, construct, or alter any sign not included as an "exempt" sign under in this chapter without first filing with the Zoning Officer an application in writing and obtaining a formal permit. Normal sign maintenance, which only includes cleaning and repairs, shall not require a permit.



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### A word from the Fire Inspector - Robert Prato

As some of you may know, I wear a few different hats here in the township. One of the duties I perform is that of Code Enforcement Officer. I uphold the Township Codes for all the residents and businesses here in the township.

As we are approaching spring, many of us turn our thoughts to the outsides of our homes. After a long winter, they might need some attention. As per our Township codes, grass and lawns should not be higher than 6". Gardens should not have large amounts of weeds or invasive plants making them appear overgrown. The bushes and trees should be trimmed to keep sidewalks, walking paths and driveways clear and accessible. Having these things attended to serves two purposes. First, they keep your home looking neat and maintained for you as well as your neighbors. Second, is it keeps the house easily accessible to emergency responders if something occurs and they need to come to your property. If walking paths, driveways and doorways are blocked or impeded in any way by overgrown shrubs, trees, or bushes, it can hamper the efforts of emergency responders and may make matters worse in an already bad situation. Also, make sure your house numbers are





if your house is more than 50 feet away from the road, they are clearly marked on your mailbox. Four-inch-high numbers are recommended. This is also one of our Township Codes. This is so first responders can quickly and easily identify your home in an emergency. The time to address these issues is long before an emergency occurs by maintaining your property in a timely fashion as soon as the weather permits.

### Introducing Pollinator Park - Brandy Mckeever, Director of Planning and Zoning

You may have noticed the transformation of the parcel at the corner of Land Road and Turkey Trot Road. What are all those white tubes you ask; they are a protection measure for the trees and shrubs within them. Young plantings need protection until they reach maturity due to heavy deer pressure, maintenance activities and weather events. The tubes also help the plantings by encouraging growth towards to the sun and retaining moisture. In October 2023 one thousand (1,000) native trees and shrubs were planted on site by volunteers. The plantings consist of thirty (30) different native species, and they

are planted close together for a purpose. This planting method is called a Tiny Forest, which is used to transform small barren plots of land into plots packed with dense vegetation, trees, and complex ecosystems. This forest management method was developed by Dr. Akira Miyawaki, a Japanese botanist, in the 1970s and has been very successful overseas. Tiny forests are gaining traction in the United States and Pollinator Park is



the first installation in the County. Tiny forests compete for resources expediting the growth process thus creating beneficial habitat at a faster rate than traditional forests. The goal of this installation is to support diverse native flora and fauna, reduce long-term maintenance, sequester carbon, and improve stormwater management on the site. There are many other benefits that this planting can offer including improved soil, increased oxygen production and reduced soil temperatures.

The property has also been improved with two hundred and eighty-eight (288) native water tolerant plants of forty-two (42) different species in the low-lying area. This area holds stormwater runoff from surrounding impervious surfaces. Native plants have longer root systems which retain water and stabilize the soil better than turf grass. You may have seen the existing swath of native plants along Turkey Trot Road which has been enhanced with a connecting garden of diverse native species. In addition, the park has a loop trail made of woodchips from local sources and a center communal space. Signage and seating are to be installed in the future. If you would like to donate a bench to be placed in Pollinator Park, please contact Dan Sharapan, Director of Parks, Recreation & Open Space at dsharapan@warwickbucks.gov.

### Know Your Local Wildlife – Preparing for Warmer Temperatures

As temperatures rise wildlife comes to life, this includes less than welcome species such as mosquitoes. It is important to inspect your property for standing water and address those areas accordingly. Mosquitoes breed in standing water which can create an unpleasant outdoor experience. Mosquitoes are of particular concern because they can carry and transmit diseases. If you are unable to dump standing water, there are other options available such as mosquito dunks and traps. Help ensure our community is proactive with addressing this potential issue by taking action on your property.

MOVING ON TO 2024! HOPE YOU HAVE A GREAT YEAR!

2024 County Township Real Estate tax bills will be mailed by March 1st. The discount due date is April 30th or June 30th at no discount.

Central Bucks School Real Estate tax bills are mailed by July 1st. They are due at discount by August 31st or October 31st no discount. There is also an installment option. Three payments due by August, September and October. There is no discount for installments.

Please call the tax office if you do not receive your tax bill or have questions.

Properties with assessment changes will receive a notice from the Bucks County Board of Assessment. Interim bills will then be mailed. New homeowners or a property with a deed change last year, please remember to apply for the Homestead credit. You may receive a notice from the Bucks County Board of Assessment. This form is due to them by March 1st for 2024.


